# **Shetland Wool Week**

What a great week! Thank you to everyone who lent us their knitted pieces for our display. Bressay History Group has been in the news recently with their commissioning of souvenir replicas of the Bressay Stone. The original Pictish stone with its distinctive carvings was discovered in the 1852 near St Mary's Church and is probably from the 9<sup>th</sup> or 10<sup>th</sup> century. It is considered very important because of the combination of Norse, Gaelic and Pictish words and names - so important that the real stone is on display in the National Museum of Scotland, Edinburgh. The text on it reads "the cross of Necrudad, daughter of An (in memory of her husband) Benises son of Droan". The mix of Norse names (Benises) and Gaelic (Droan) suggests that families of mixed Pictish/Norse decent were living in Shetland at that time. We think it may once have even been coloured, but but after 900 years standing in the Shetland weather there is of course no trace.

Scottish artist Alice Martin was commissioned by the History Group to create the 15cm high 3D souvenir replica. They are made in resin and individually hand finished. You can buy one from the Bressay Heritage Centre or email bressayheritage@btinternet.com.

A fine autumn or winter day is a great time to get out and see the life size replica in St. Mary's Kirk at Culliesbrough. St. Mary's itself is the earliest known cruciform (cross-shaped) kirk in Shetland and sits within an interesting graveyard, perched on the ruins of an Iron Age Broch. There is evidence that the township has been inhabited since Neolithic times, finally abandoned in 1897. For more information and a printable walk leaflet visit www.bressay.org/visit.

A festive activity for the bairns! Suitable for ages 8+


With both classes all materials are provided, but you're welcome to bring along anything you might have to incorporate too.
