As we said in our last newsletter, we'll soon be asking you to tell us about your life on Bressay. We'd like to identify issues facing island residents, identify what facilities and amenities residents need and would like, and to prioritise our work. There will be several parts to our consultation;

A paper survey - included in this newsletter. Please fill it in and let us know what you think of life on your island. You can hand the finished survey in to Speldiburn or the Mail Shop by April 28th. Or please just email us with your thoughts.

Interviews with as many organisations and businesses on the island as we can. If you'd like to take part, get in touch.

Open afternoon at Speldiburn. Sunday 19th March. 2-4 pm. A chance for everyone to identify and celebrate our island's strengths. There will be art activities for bairns and Community Council Members and BDL directors will be around to chat. The cafe will be open for tea and homebakes.

SURF Award win

Bressay Development Ltd won the Community Regeneration Category at the annual SURF Awards, for the re-purposing of the school into the Speldiburn Community Hub. SURF (Scotland's Regeneration Forum) aims to improve the lives and opportunities of residents in Scotland's disadvantaged communities. The award recognises best practice and innovation.

In October, judges spent time at Speldiburn with staff and volunteers. They had a strong sense of Speldiburn being run for the community by the community, and thought that we had broad appeal and made the most of the space. Aimee and Heather accepted the award on behalf of everyone involved in Speldiburn's development. Through SURF, BDL will also be helping others to benefit from the lessons we have learned on our journey.

Bressay Stone Masons and Quarries

Bressay History Group has begun a new project exploring Bressay's quarries and the men who worked them. Bressay is famous for providing the building and roofing stone to Lerwick and beyond. Bressay's stone masons also seem to have been in high demand for work in Lerwick during the 19th and early 20th century. An account dated September 1831, from Joseph Irvine, Merchant, Lerwick, bought of Gilbert Laurenson, shipped on board the sloop Brisk, two thousand slate for account of the Revd John Bryden, Sandsting. James Laurenson at Midgarth in 1841 was Gilbert's son and also a stone mason.

Alongside the slate quarries on the hillsides at Aith, there was a commercial quarry at the Bard, skew quarry on the banks east of Aith, a flag quarry below the Ord and a clay quarry at the Wirlie. There are small but significant

quarries near Gardie and in the Silver Valley. Small quarries can be found near

to almost every croft house, the stone being quarried as near to site as possible. Bernard took on to survey the house and quarry at the Lower Daal, proving that the quarry (directly north of the house) is large enough to provide all the stone required. Bressay History Group would welcome any information on masons, quarries and related stories.

Bressay Lighthouse

BDL have been asked by Shetland Amenity Trust to look at possibilities for community ownership of the lighthouse as part of their process of selling the site.

Owning, running and maintaining a 'listed' site can be costly, and its refurbishment is a massive undertaking. It needs a good and viable business plan, probably different from Shetland's current lighthouses. A new trust would need to be set up with members from across the community, hopefully including those with some relevant experience. Alternatively, the lighthouse could be sold to a private buyer with a commercially viable plan. Both routes could potentially provide employment on the island.

Shetland Amenity Trust will open the lighthouse for an afternoon for us so that we can show people round and listen to their views. We'll provide examples of other community and privately owned lighthouses. We'd love to hear from you if you have ideas on the day, or get in touch with us here.
